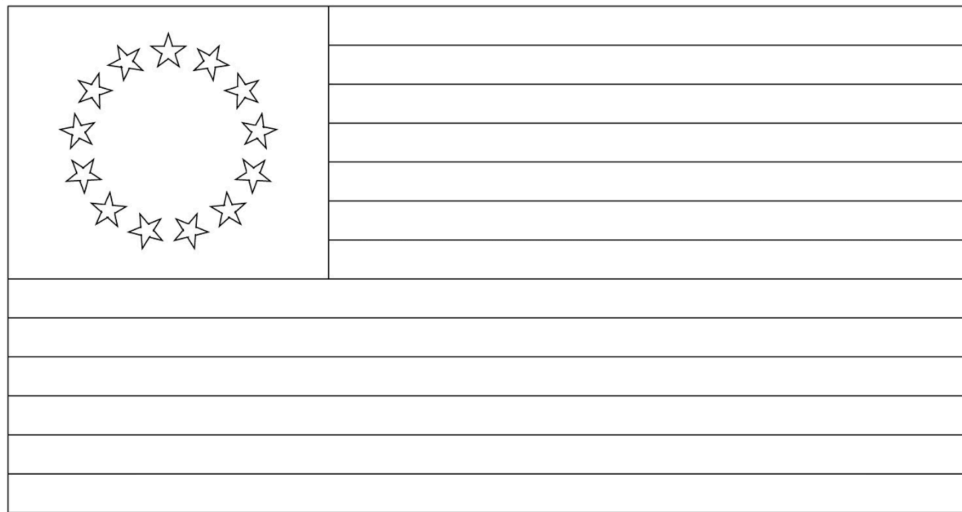

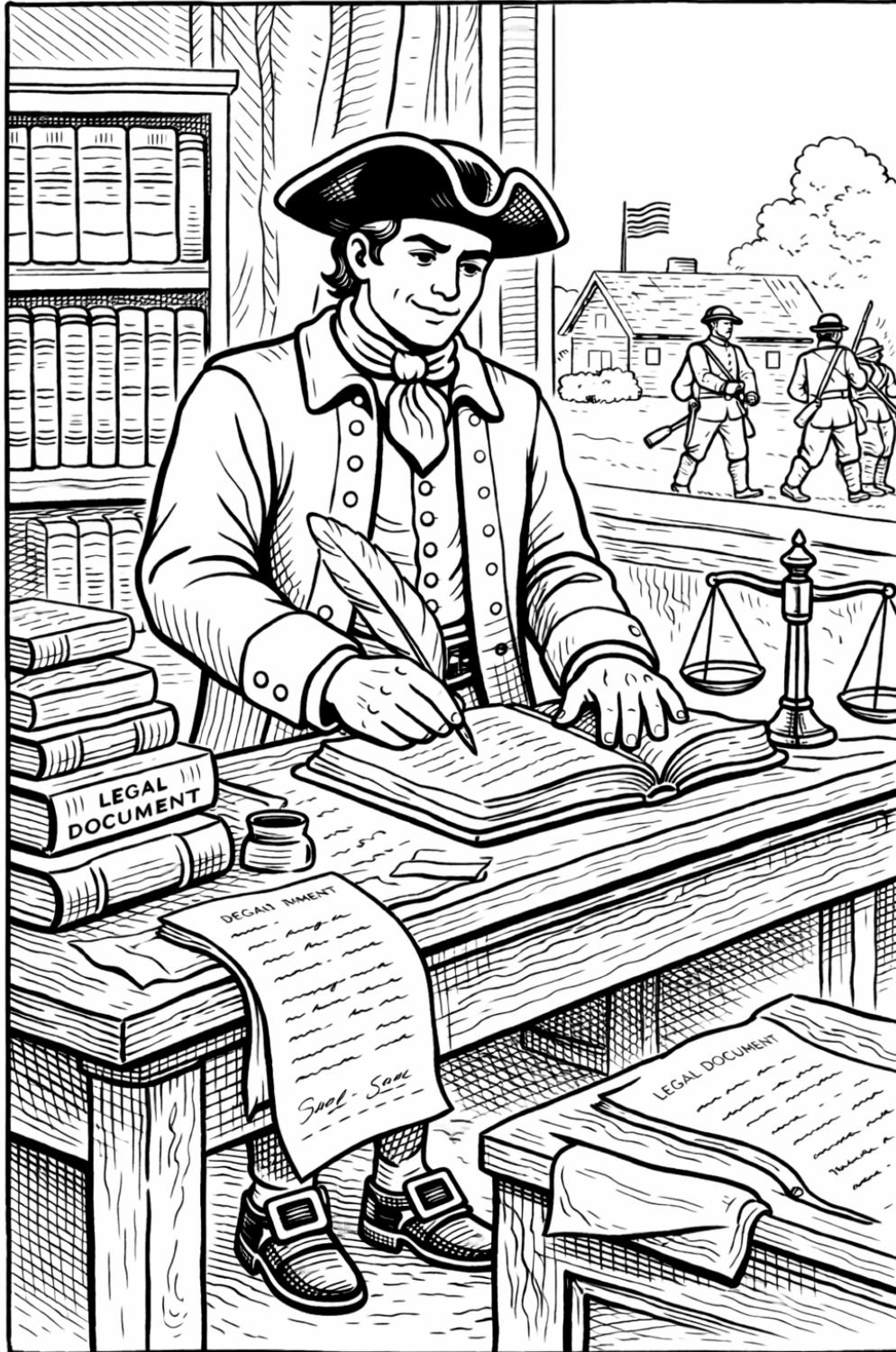

# Jacob Campbell



Jacob joined the militia as a teenager. He did guard duty on the East Greenwich, Rhode Island waterfront, and fought in the Battle of Rhode Island when he was only 17 years old. He loved to write poetry. He graduated from college and became a teacher and then an attorney. He died of illness when he was 28, and one of his poems is on his grave.

# Joseph Greene



Joseph Greene was one of the founders of the Kentish Guards militia in East Greenwich, Rhode Island. He served as a sergeant for more than two years, and fought in the Battle of Rhode Island. He manufactured rope used on boats. He and his wife Patience had nine children.

# Dr. Joseph Joslyn



**Dr. Joseph Joslyn was born in Scotland, and came to East Greenwich, Rhode Island to run a hospital. He served as the regimental surgeon for Colonel James Mitchell Varnum's Ninth Rhode Island Regiment. His only child, Elisabeth, died in 1778 when she was two years old.**

# Nathan Miller



Nathan Miller lived in Warwick, Rhode Island. He operated a forge and made knives and bayonets for soldiers. During the Revolutionary War, Nathan was made a captain in the militia, and fought in the Battle of Rhode Island. He and his wife Robey had seven children.
